### Pattern of the Month

**One Skein – A Stole** by Katja Jordan;  
modified by Jeanne Rippere

Notes:

Finished size (blocked): 56 cm x 224 cm.

Gauge is not important, just make sure that you like the look of the pattern in your yarn and needle size . I recommend knitting a swatch (row 1-8 of the middle section with 15 stitches will do – just start with k2) and blocking it. Then you can pre-estimate how big your own stole will be, too.

You can easily adjust the length of the stole by adding or subtracting repeats of the middle section. And if you want to have a wider stole, just add a few stitches when casting on (you need an odd number of stitches).

Drop stitches are part and parcel of this stole. They form long, delicate stitches, which emphasize hand dyed yarns very well, too. There are different ways to knit these drop stitches. Please follow the instructions, cause you'll get nicer edge stitches with this

method..

**Materials:**

\_ One skein of Noro Kureyon Sock Yarn (420m/100g) or another yarn with a similar weight, 5.5 mm circular needles.

**Stitches and Abbreviations Used:**

k = knit

K2tog = Knit 2 stitches together

yo = Yarn over

D = Drop Stitch: Act as if you are going to knit one stitch as normal, but instead of just wrapping the yarn around the needle once, wrap it three times! At the next row, knit the stitch and slide the extra wraps off the needle.

**Instructions:**

Cast on 55 stitches very loosely.

**Beginning:**

Row 1: k all stitches

Row 2: k all stitches

Row 3: k all stitches

Row 4: k all stitches

Row 5: work all stitches as D

Row 6: k all stitches (drop the wraps)

Row 7: k all stitches

Row 8: k all stitches

Row 9: work all stitches as D

Row 10: k all stitches (drop the wraps)

Row 11: k all stitches

Row 12: k all stitches

Row 13: work all stitches as D

Row 14: k all stitches (drop the wraps)

Row 15: k all stitches

Row 16: k all stitches

**Middle Section:**

Row 1: k1, \* yo, k2tog; repeat from \* to end

Row 2: k all stitches

Row 3: k all stitches

Row 4: k all stitches

Row 5: work all stitches as D

Row 6: k all stitches (drop the wraps)

Row 7: k all stitches

Row 8: k all stitches

Repeat Rows 1-8 until the stole is the length you want.

**End:**

Row 1: k1, \* yo, k2tog; repeat from \* to end

Row 2: k all stitches

Row 3: k all stitches

Row 4: k all stitches

Row 5: work all stitches as D

Row 6: k all stitches (drop the wraps)

Row 7: k all stitches

Row 8: k all stitches

Row 9: work all stitches as D

Row 10: k all stitches (drop the wraps)

Row 11: k all stitches

Row 12: k all stitches

Row 13: work all stitches as D

Row 14: k all stitches (drop the wraps)

Row 15: k all stitches

Row 16: k all stitches

Bind off all stitches very loosely. Weave in the ends and

block the stole, using your preferred method. I'd

recommend washing it gently (which will soften the Noro yarn a bit) and pinning it out with needles or blocking wires.

Blocking is really important here, don't skip it!
